# **About the Community Needs Assessment**

As required by Section 1302.11 of the Head Start Program Performance Standards, Community Improvement Council, Inc. – Head Start (CIC – Head Start) must conduct a community assessment once every five years, with updates annually.

The Community Needs Assessment is a strategic planning and needs assessment tool to help CIC – Head Start to determine long-term and short-term program goals and objectives. In addition, the Community Needs Assessment identifies issues and trends within the CIC – head Start service area that directly impacts vulnerable families with young children.

The 2023 Community Assessment provides the most recent data available regarding demographics, early learning programs, disabilities, health, nutrition, and social services for children and families in the Danville, VA region. The assessment provides a snapshot of the CIC – Head Start program and its activities and identifies available community resources. This assessment also identifies where there are gaps between available services and needs.

Ultimately, the Community Needs Assessment is used to make decisions for enrollment, recruitment, selection, eligibility, attendance, and the most appropriate delivery of Head Start services. It is a valuable resource for staff, parents, and community partners to collectively think about the impacts of population shifts and equitable distribution of services.

# **Service Area**

### City of Danville, VA

Danville is an independent city in the Commonwealth of Virginia in the United States, located on the fall line of the Dan River. According to the



United States Census Bureau, the city has a total area of 42.8 square miles (113.7 km2), of which 43.1 square miles (111.6 km2) is land and 1.0 square mile (2.6 km2) (2.3%) is water.

### **Distinguishing Characteristics**

Caesars Entertainment states "property plans include a 500-room hotel [tower] and a world-class casino gaming floor with over 1,300 slots, 85 live table games, 24 electronic table games, a WSOP poker room and a Caesars Sportsbook. In addition, the resort will feature a full-service spa, pool, high-quality bars and restaurants, a d 2,500-seat state-of-the-art live entertainment theater and 40,000 square feet of meeting and convention space." The casino and resort is set to be completed by late 2024, but the casino tycoons have debuted a temporary casino on site that opened May 15, 2023. It is estimated that the completed resort will provide over 1,300 jobs to the community and its surrounding areas.

Tyson Foods started construction in 2021 for their planned 325,000 square foot facility in Cane Creek Industrial Park in Pittsylvania County, just outside of Danville City limits. The facility is estimated to provide 400 jobs to the community and its surrounding areas.

### City Governing Structure

### Council-Manager Government

Council-manager government combines the strong political leadership of elected officials with the strong managerial experience of an appointed manager or administrator. All power and authority to set policy rests with an elected governing body, which includes a mayor or chairperson and the members of the council, commission, or board. The governing body in turn hires a non-partisan manager who has very broad authority to run the organization.

### Mayor/Vice Mayor

Alonzo Jones is the current Mayor and Gary P. Miller is the current Vice Mayor of the City of Danville. Alonzo L. Jones was elected to City Council in 2010 and re-elected in 2014,2018, and 2022. He served as Vice Mayor from July 1, 2016, to June 30, 2018. On July 1, 2018, he was elected by the Council to serve as Mayor and was re-elected as Mayor in 2020 and 2022. Gary P. Miller, M.D. F.A.C.C., a local cardiologist, was appointed to City Council in 2008 to fill an unexpired term. Served as Vice-Mayor from 2014-2016 and 2020 to present.















■ All Ages ■ Ages 0-17





# Homelessness and Domestic Violence



House of Hope – Homeless Shelter
Located in downtown Danville, House of
Hope is a faith-based, emergency homeless
shelter that serves the City of Danville and
the surrounding area. House of Hope has
provided refuge to those who do not have
a place to stay for over 10 years.





Haven of the Dan River Region – Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault Shelter HAVEN of the Dan River Region is a non-profit organization set up for the purpose of raising awareness about domestic violence and sexual assault, providing services to meet the needs of victims, and providing a safe shelter for victims and their children.

The shelter is staffed 24/7. Victims can call the agency phone number to talk to staff and arrange to come to the shelter.

Limited data or no data exists for these organizations to protect the privacy of the clients they serve.



**Project Literacy** is a non-profit, community-based organization dedicated to improving literacy rates among adults in Danville, Virginia. They believe that literacy is the foundation of education, opportunity, and social and civic participation.

Project Literacy offers one-on-one tutoring to 18+ individuals. The tutors are trained volunteers who spend at least an hour a week with each client. They also teach English as a Second Language.

"Children of parents with lo literacy skills have a 72% chance of being at the lowest reading levels themselves." Says Project Literacy. "Of adults with the


lowest literacy levels, 43% live in poverty, and 70% of adult welfare recipients have low literacy levels. An excess of \$230 Billion a year in health care costs is linked to low adult literacy."

# Rate of Child Abuse and Neglect founded number per 1,000 children












### Free and Reduced Price School Lunch Program Eligibility




### Eligible SNAP Clients by Locality






### Eligible TANF Clients by Locality





### Eligible Medicaid Clients by Locality












# Enrolled Students by Income Status (As of December 2023)


### **Enrolled Participants by Race**




### **Enrolled Participants by Sex**




### **Enrolled Participants by Age**



# Participants with Approved IEPs by Disability Type




CIC is partnered with Danville Public Schools to assist students who are referred for speech services as well as with the development of an IEP or IFSP.




# Brigance Screening Results 2023-2024 SY




### Dental Screening Results 2023-2024 SY




### Speech/Language Screening Results 2023-2024 SY




# Hearing Screening Results 2023-2024 SY




# Vision Screening Results 2023-2024 SY




# Participants BMI at Enrollment 2023-2024 SY





# **Community Trends**

### 1. City Demographics

- o The community experienced a -.09% population decrease from 2021 to 2022.
- o There was a 0.2% increase in the Hispanic population of the community from 2021 to 2022.
- o The population of children under 5 has decreased by 85 children from 2021 to 2022.
- o 3.7% (+0.3%) of Danville residents were foreign born persons.
- o 9.2% (+2%) of Danville residents are veterans.
- Rent increased from \$688 to \$733 from the previous reported year.
- The number of families living in the same house for more than 1 year increased 0.6%.
- O Access to technology at home increased from 83.4% to 84.8%, a +1.4% change.
- Civil labor force of able-bodied individuals 16+ years old decreased 0.5%.
- Children in poverty increased 0.4%. All persons in poverty increased 2.1%
- o The City of Danville is recorded as paying nearly \$20/hour less than the Virginia state average.
- The following cost of living factors have decreased: housing (0.5%), groceries (0.5%), transportation (0.3%), and health care (3.6%). The following cost of living factors have increased: utilities (0.1%), and miscellaneous (6.8%)

### 2. Health and Social Services

- The air quality in Danville has improved 2.9 points.
- Cancer and Heart Disease remain the number two leading causes of death in the community.
- o Lead beat out Salmonellosis in communicable diseases for the #1 spot.

### 3. Nutrition

- SNAP participants increased by 1,298 from 2022 to 2023.
- TANF participants decreased by 178 from 2022 to 2023.
- Eligible Medicaid Clients increased by 1,701 from 2022 to 2023.
