### **Special Projects/Funding**

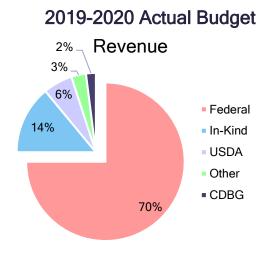

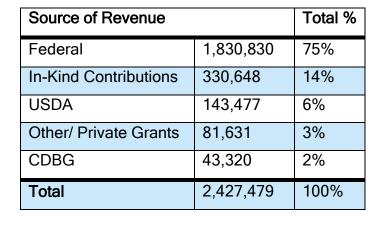




# **FINANCE**

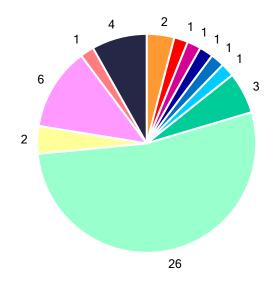

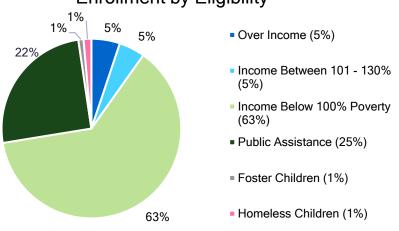

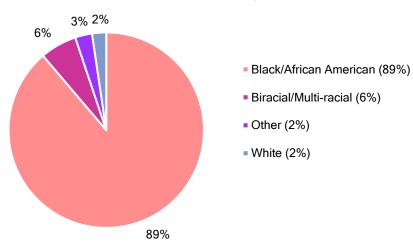




# **Enrollment by Eligibility**

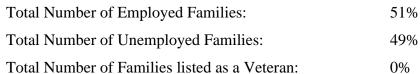

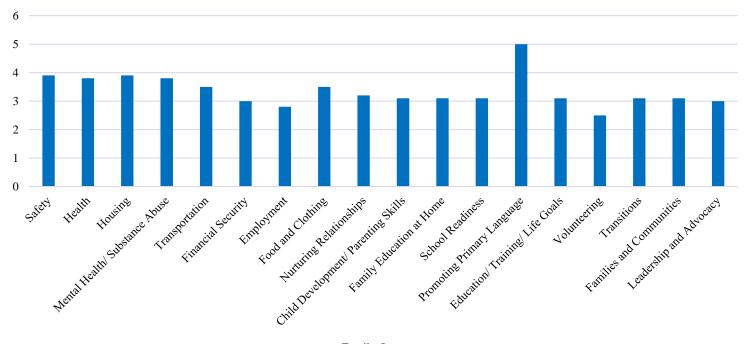

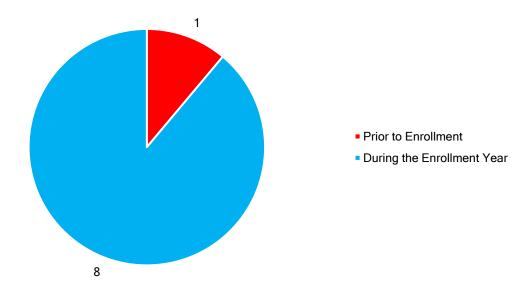

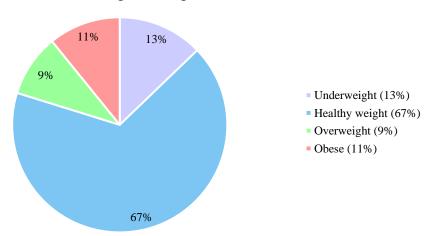

### Child Weight Categories at Enrollment



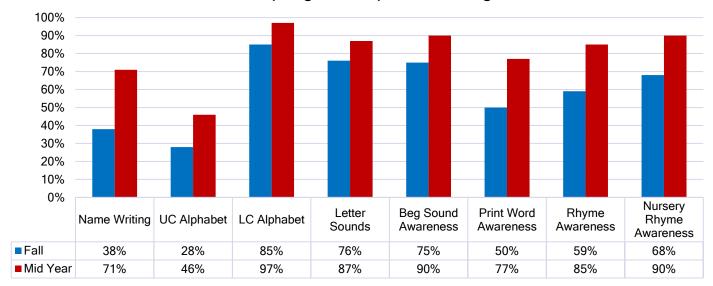

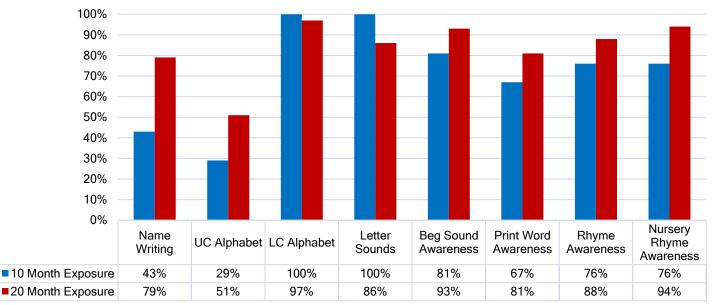

Fall 2019 - Mid Year 2019 PALS PRE K Meets Spring Developmental Range

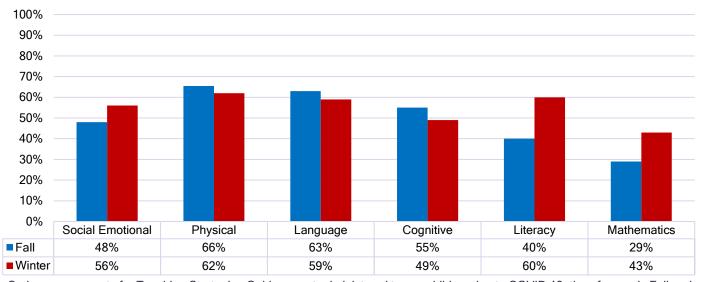


## Mid Year 2019 PALS PRE K Meets Spring Developmental Range

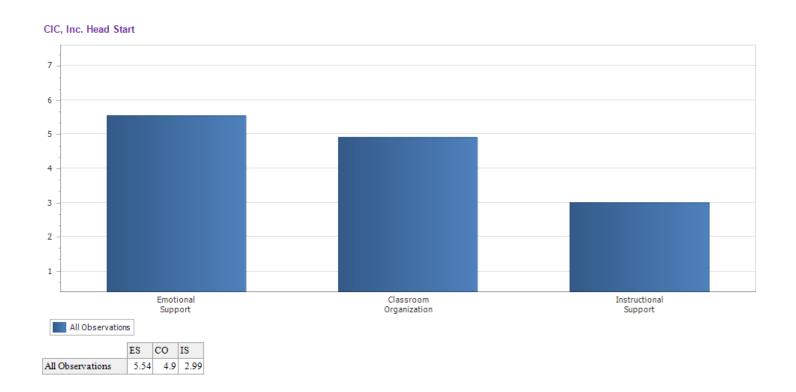

# **COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT SUMMARY**

Since the last US Census in 2010, the documented population of the City of Danville has declined, indicating that there will be fewer 3 to 5 year old children living in the region within the next few years. There has also been an increase in people living in poverty at all ages, but a decrease in children living in poverty that could potentially lead to a decrease in the amount of Head Start eligible children in the City of Danville area. With the decline in population, the City of Danville's Virginia Preschool Initiative program has experienced a decline in its participants, from 253 four-year-old participants to 212.

Community Improvement Council, Inc. – Head Start families have maintained a minimum of stable housing and transportation. However, families are utilizing transportation services offered by the program.

The rate of children under the age of four in CPS Referrals has decreased from 241 cases to 192 the rate of child abuse and neglect found in the City of Danville more than doubled between 2014 and 2016, rising from 1.2 per 1,000 children to 2.8 per 1,000 children. The total number of Child Protective Services referrals for SY2019 was 785.

Overall, the City of Danville/CIC, Inc – Head Start is improving in the areas of poverty and unemployment, though areas such as child abuse, neglect, and mental health/disability statistics are worsening.

This data reflects the recent impacts of COVID-19 as much as possible. Certain areas of information are more heavily impacted by COVID-19 than others.
